From the Chaplain's Desk

Time-line: Six months after the completion of the Temple construction in Jerusalem . . .

A nobleman and his caravan stopped for a day of rest at Kiriath-jearim. The nobleman was returning from Joppa, a city whose port had proved most valuable to Jerusalem during the temple construction. It was late in the day and according to the customs of his homeland the meal was prepared by the servants and the nobleman faced East and prayed before eating the meal. Dinner was a large meal with the last of the fish from Joppa and the brazed oxen his servants had just slaughtered. The nobleman was excited to return home as he had many dignitaries to host in the near future. But, who was this nobleman? Neither he nor his servants were Muslims in fact, they were Jews and the nobleman was none other than King Solomon himself.

"But will God indeed dwell on the earth? Behold, heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain you; how much less this house that I have built! Yet have regard to the prayer of your servant and to his plea, O Lord my God, listening to the cry and to the prayer that your servant prays before you this day, that your eyes may be open night and day toward this house, the place of which you have said, 'My name shall be there,' that you may listen to the prayer that your servant offers toward this place." -1 Kings 8:27-29

We see by this scripture that King Solomon prayed facing the Temple because he knew that a part of God would always reside there. The only reason Solomon would have faced East at Kiriath-jearim is that the Temple at Jerusalem was East of Kiriath-jearim if he had been at Mt. Nebo he would have prayed to the West. It is from this example that we should remember that it is not the direction we face that matters in prayer, but rather the heart of the sender and the spirit of the message that are most important. As for the location of the Temple, it is within each of us. For such as God's only begotten Son hath said, "I am with you always, even unto the end of the age." Matthew 28:20
